India, British experts discuss cyber security

New Delhi, March 26 (IANS) Top experts from India and Britain discussed cyber security and online security, a pressing international issue demanding global cooperation, an official release said Tuesday.

The discussions were part of a four-day workshop, which began on March 24 and has been jointly organised by Research Councils UK (RCUK) and India's department of science and technology, the Indraprastha Institute of Information Technology-Delhi (IIIT-D), and Britain's Science and Innovation Network (SIN), the release said.

Cyber crime, privacy and security in online social media, human factors and usable security, risk identification and monitoring of systems and networks were among the topics discussed at the workshop.

The world's increased reliance on electronic systems means that cyber attacks are likely to have significant damaging consequences, said the release.

"We need a clearer understanding of our current and future vulnerabilities and the inadequacies of current approaches, along with innovative solutions to tackle the important challenges," said RCUK deputy director Helen Bailey.

Ponnuram Kumaraguru, a teacher at IIIT Delhi, added: "We are also exploring the strengths and complementarities of our respective research capabilities; and identifying key areas of research which may offer a great potential for international research collaboration for mutual benefit."

This workshop is part of the growing research relationship between Britain and India.

Counter terrorism expert analyses spate of Maoi...
Girdih/Birbhum/New Delhi April 19 (ANI): Counter terrorism expert Ajay Sahni gave his analytic view over the spate of Maoist attacks that have gained momentum in red corridor areas during the ongoing elections. Ajay Sahni, analyzing the prevailing insurgency, called for effective administration to tackle the armed Maoists who are in constant conflict with the establishment. Sahni said that only effective governance could change the situation on the ground, as the red rebels believe that they are fighting for the cause of poor and common man. However, Sahni said the most profound reason for the strategic failure if bluntly put was sheer and enduring neglect. Sahni concluded saying that current capacities of the establishments cannot be reconciled with any coherent CI strategy (Continuous improvement strategy) against the Maoists. Meanwhile, in Birbhum district of West Bengal a villager recovered a live bomb lying on the road side, about which he later informed the concerned authorities.
